


Aimed at providing a sense of place and a vibrant community space, the design welcomes people from all backgrounds ensuring the unity among the differences. As a community requires social interaction, the design incorporates social inclusion and activity as well as maintain the quality of individual space.



The main challenge of incorporating public road within the boundary was overcomed by providing common spaces in the proximity. Residential zones were developed considering the contour levels on site in the outskirts of the common








Affinity Housing is designed to create common spaces on various levels and an environment for collective growth of the residents sharing their feelings, intentions, attitudes, and experiences and social part of life. Housing is designed with an axis along river wuth landscapes, major roads and riverfront and distribution of housing spaces and landscape with respect to it and perpendicualr axis.

One of the important feature of the design is the landscape and green spaces. Garden and landscape enhances the setting of housing and it improves the place feature and affects the human mood.










BIRD HOUSE 2 ANKIT SHRESTHA


